

Purpose of report: - For Information

1. ACTION RECOMMENDED

1.1 That Members of the Committee note progress to date with the implementation of the agreed action plan for 2016/17.

2. 2016/17 BUDGET AND PRIORITISED ACTIONS

- 2.1 Members are reminded that the Committee had an estimated budget available for 2016/17 of £30,155.63 and had allocated £27,100 for projects and initiatives, leaving an anticipated remaining budget of £5,267.36 available (including any project underspend identified).
 - (Members are reminded that there is an additional £2,000 allocated as a contingency for signage improvements (Dunstable Joint Committee Minute 13, 12 July 2012)).
- 2.2 Following the last meeting of the Committee, the Action Plan has been refreshed and is attached at appendix 1. As is detailed in the Action Plan, the majority of the actions for 2016/17 have now been completed, with the exception of some ongoing projects that are contingent on funding or require revisiting post de-trunking of the A5.

3. UPDATE ON ONGOING TOWN CENTRE ACTIONS

3.1 Christmas Programme

- 3.1.2 As Members will be aware, the Dunstable Joint Committee funded a synthetic ice rink that was installed on The Square from 16 to 22 December as part of the Christmas programme for 2016.
- 3.1.3 Tickets for the rink were sold via Dunstable Town Council's website and from Priory House at a cost of £3.00 per adult and £2.00 per child with a family ticket for two adults and two children at a discounted rate of £8.00.
- 3.1.4 The rink operated from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm each day with an additional evening session until 8.00 pm on the first day. Maximum capacity on the rink was 35 persons at any one time, for a duration of 45 minutes. A total of 1,610 individual tickets were available for the attraction.
- 3.1.5 The rink proved popular with a total of 706 tickets sold, equating to 1,084 individual persons skating during the course of the week and positive feedback was received from users. Income for the rink has gone to offset a small amount of the overall costs of providing the attraction.

- 3.1.6 As part of the Christmas Promotions, a Festive Shop Front Competition was run, encouraging businesses to light and decorate their frontage and with the prize for the winning business being an advert in the spring edition of the Town Council's Talk of the Town magazine. A total of 17 businesses signed up to take part. The judging was done by the Mayor of Dunstable and Chairman of the Dunstable Joint Committee and took place on Wednesday 21 December. The winning business for 2016 was Angliss Carpets in Church Street with Lisa Roberts Catering of Ashton Square and Hair Boutique of High Street South as runners up.
- 3.1.7 Residents were also asked to send in pictures of their external festive decorations with vouchers on offer to spend in the town centre for the winner and two runners up. Unfortunately only two entries were received. However, it is hoped that the lighting festival can be developed for future years.
- 3.1.8 The Dunstable Joint Committee also contributed to the addition of a lighting and pyrotechnic finale for the annual Christmas Tree Carols and Torchlight Procession on 2 December and to the Christmas Themed, Dunstable wide event that took place on Saturday 3 December. Both events were previously discussed at the December meeting of the Committee.
- 3.2 Programme of Themed Events for 2017
- 3.2.1 Following on from the Party in the Market programme in 2016, Dunstable Town Council will be promoting a series of themed markets for 2017.
- 3.2.2 The themed markets will take place on the second Saturday of each month from April through to December, between 10.00 am to 3.00 pm, beginning with a Health and Beauty theme on 8 April 2017. All traders trading on the themed market days will benefit from the discounted event rate of £15.00 per stall. The full programme is as follows:

- 3.2.3 Following on from the youth event with Central Bedfordshire College last year, officers are working to develop a youth themed market as part of the programme where services are promoted by organisations who work with and for young people, but also including young people selling goods they have made. To this end, organisations have been identified for direct marketing and an email has been sent out with details of the event, encouraging participation. Members will be kept updated on progress with this and the other themed markets in the programme.
- 3.2.4 In addition to the themed markets there will be a Creative Craft Market with goods handmade in Bedfordshire, on the third Saturday of each month. The craft market will again be taking place from April through to December, following on from the trial in October. November and December 2016. All those trading on the craft market days will also be charged £15.00 per stall and again this includes existing traders and non-craft traders.

4.1.1 Traders

 continue to promote the market through the Dunstable Town Council website, social media and

4.1.2 Dunstable Market Questionnaire

- Following a request from Members of Dunstable Town Council's Community Services Committee, a Dunstable Market questionnaire has been devised to ascertain the views of residents and visitors about the market.
- The survey includes questions about the locations, retail mix and average spend on the market as well as more general information about shopping habits.
- The survey went live on Survey Monkey in January, with hard copies also being made available from Priory House, Grove House, Creasey Park Community Football Centre and Dunstable Market (from traders).
- The survey has been promoted in the Talk of the Town, Town Council website and through social media.
- At the time of writing 12 hard copies of the survey have been returned and there have been 276 responses on Survey Monkey.
- The survey will continue to be promoted and responses collected over the first half of the year and results will be reported back to the September meeting of the Community Services Committee.

5. Town Centre Vacancy Rates

- 5.1 The vacancy rates to the end of December 2017 are provided below.
- 5.2 The town centre area used for the survey includes properties in High Street North up to Regent Street, High Street South to Friars Walk (excluding Thames Industrial Estate), Church Street up to and including Aldi and West Street up to the Police Station/St Mary's Gate.

- 5.3 Eleanor's Cross, Ashton Square, Albion Street, The Quadrant and Grove Park (including Asda) have been included but rates can be calculated with or without these properties.
- 5.4 These figures have been shared with Central Bedfordshire Council officers and more detail of the vacancy rates across Central Bedfordshire Council is given at agenda item 9.

Notes

There were a total of 17 arrests made as a result of information supplied to the police in the period of this report.

Incidents of driving offences and anti social behaviour continue to be a problem in the area of the Skate Park and Grove Theatre Car Park.

Incidents of littering offences are increasing in the White Lion Retail Park car parks and in the area of the Skate Park. Any incidents recorded are passed to CBC Environmental Protection Officers for investigation and the issue of Fixed Penalty Notices.

2. REGENERATION & BUSINESS

2.1 Dunstable Town Centre Regeneration

Dunstable Town Centre has a number of Central Bedfordshire assets that have the potential to enact positive change and enhance regeneration. Crucial for this is Dunstable High Street's detrunking and subsequent improvements following the M1-A5 link road opening in Spring 2017 (date to be confirmed). Our goal is to create a safe, active and attractive high street more fitting for Dunstable's important historic character. We already have £1.5m from Highways England as part of their A5-M1 Legacy initiative and an additional £500,000 capital funding committed for this work. However we will continue to secure funding for further development schemes to enhance regeneration even further along the High Street.

CBC continues to support Dunstable Town Council in its delivery of its MTRF bid and its engagement with the HSIS which is due to complete by Spring 2018. New applications are being received from many shop fronts along the high street, which will greatly improve the aesthetics of the town. The partnership with Dunstable Town Council in the Market Town Regeneration Fund is also resulting in a number of tangible positive outcomes in the town centre, such as an improved entrance to Priory Gardens and cleaning equipment.

Alongside this, the redeveloped Leisure Centre will provide state of the art facilities for the community, including a new library. Work will start Summer 2017 and is due to open towards the end of 2018. The new leisure centre will save the tax payer money and will also release an exciting regeneration opportunity for Dunstable. The current Dunstable Library sits at a prominent position in the town centre, but requires redevelopment, and Central Bedfordshire is looking at options for its long term use. In addition, we are currently working on an option to develop Dunstable's former courthouse to introduce new student housing to the town centre, which will make Dunstable an even greater place to study and thrive. A formal decision on the future use of Dunstable's Former Courthouse is expected in Autumn 2017. We are also receiving promising updates from the Quadrant and White Lion Square about new business. All these projects and more form part of Dunstable's exciting new future where there will be a transformation over the next five years. Central Bedfordshire will provide more details on the regeneration projects and the programme to this Joint Committee for discussion as soon as they can be made available.

2.3 Business Support

In the last quarter, there have been 9 enquiries for business support, including advice from our Business TimeBank service. We have worked with new start ups in the area, as well as existing businesses. We continue to offer business support to any business that would like assistance. For full information of how our team can support local businesses, please contact business@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk.

2.4 FEAST

Feast is a part ERDF funded project (total £7million of which £3.5million is ERDF) to offer a range of useful services to food and drinks manufacturers over the next three years, including; grant funding, business mentoring, industry events, technical support and technical apprentices. In order to be eligible to access services through the FEAST project, business must be:

- · A food and drink manufacturer
- Based in D2N2, SEMLEP Areas
- An SME Business (Small / Medium Enterprise)

CBC is a delivery partner in the project with the aim of promoting the project in the SEMLEP area and providing a link with the CBC Food Enterprise Zone and Agrifood priority sector.

2.5 Inward Investment

In the last quarter, there have been 9 enquiries for vacant units on the Woodside and Houghton Regis Estates. This takes our total number of Inward Investment enquiries across Central Bedfordshire since April to 181 which is 120% of our target.

2.6 Be Central Bedfordshire website

(<u>www.becentralbedfordshire.co.uk</u>) continues to attract interest from potential investors with 9300 visits to the site and more than 900 property searches since 1st April 2016, with Houghton Regis and Dunstable featuring prominently. The team have launched Twitter and Linked In accounts to further attract website traffic @BeCentralBeds, https://www.linkedin.com/company/becentralbeds

2.7 Business Growth and Support Scheme

Funding is available for SME's looking to move into or expand within Central Bedfordshire. The Business Support and Growth Fund is targeted at SME's and aligns with council service priorities of supporting business, jobs growth and increasing skills.

The scheme is offering support in three distinct areas as follows with a maximum award of £5k per business, capped at a maximum of 6 months business rates charges.

- a) Reduced Business Rates Offer
- b) Early Pre-Application Planning Advice
- c) Public Protection Food Hygiene Training and Coaching Programme

For a business to qualify for support from the fund, it will need to demonstrate that it meets with one or more of the criteria below, which will ensure that the support is directed to the key target area.

- 1) Supports an Inward Investment enquiry bringing new jobs in to the area.
- 2) Assists an existing business already based within Central Bedfordshire to expand and create additional jobs in the area.
- 3) Supports an existing business already based in Central Bedfordshire to maintain existing jobs.
- 4) Enables a new business start up and go live.
- 5) Supports a business to increase skills levels within its workforce.
- 6) Enhance compliance levels with statutory Central Bedfordshire Council requirements.

2.8 Employment and Skills

Using money from the Skills Funding Agency, CBC's Bedfordshire Employment & Skills Service (BESS) continues to provide support for local residents to increase their employability.

The BESS 'offer' consists of training courses provided by the in-house Direct Delivery team and five external providers.

The 'offer' is complete by the availability of Information, Advice & Guidance on a 1:1 basis for residents seeking advice on careers and local jobs.

The external providers include:

- Impact Peer Support who continues to provide excellent courses aimed at residents who have mild to moderate mental health difficulties. Feedback from participants has been excellent and for some it has been life changing.
- Noah Enterprise (Luton based) who are delivering courses aimed at those furthest away from the labour market through homelessness or who are recovering from addiction. The courses include ESOL and IT.
- TCHC offer a range of courses including IT, Social Media and Understanding Enterprise.
 Some of the courses are especially attractive for residents considering self employment.
- Voluntary Community Action (South Beds) deliver a range of Step-Into courses include (amongst others) Customer Service & Retail, Health & Social Care, Warehousing & Distribution. These are short courses and designed to provide a 'taster' into specific sectors.
- SSG are the largest external provider and will be delivering courses in the Dunstable and Houghton Regis area later in the academic year. They deliver generic employability courses which are well regarded and are effective in providing skills such as team work, communication skills, problem solving etc. as skills which are relevant for a wide range of employers.

Course delivery will be increasing over the coming months in Dunstable to ensure there is equitable delivery throughout Central Bedfordshire and Bedford Borough. Additionally BESS is developing closer links with the Housing Support Team to ensure tenants have an improved access to the training courses and it is hoped this will have positive benefits for those living in deprived areas of the town as they are supported towards employment.

2.9 High Street Vacancy Levels

As part of the ongoing monitoring of the Economic Development Plan the Council is monitoring the level of high street vacancies in 'A' class premises in Central Bedfordshire's town centres. The overall average vacancy rate within town centres that have been monitored to date is 6.1% in February 2017. This has increased from the 4.4% in November 2016, although there are still 3 counts to be made. Biggleswade and Houghton Regis have seen an increase in vacant units, with a decrease being seen in Dunstable. Dunstable still remains the town with the most vacancies, 33 or 13.4% of all premises, but it is good to note that 4 recently vacant units are currently under development for tenants. Central Bedfordshire's vacancy rate is lower than Britain's rate of 12.2% in February 2016 (Source: The Local Data Company).

3. LEISURE, LIBRARIES & COUNTRYSIDE

3.1 DUNSTABLE LEISURE CENTRE

The Centre will close in summer 2017 and our team is working hard with all of the clubs to find suitable alternative provision for our customers whilst the work takes place. The new Centre will open in winter 2018.

We are securing suitable alternative locations and activities throughout the Central Bedfordshire area, in the first instance, ensuring as many of the loyal Dunstable Leisure Centre customers retain their healthy lifestyle. Some activities will be relocated at Tiddenfoot Leisure Centre, Houghton Regis Leisure Centre, the swimming pools at Flitwick and Saxon in Biggleswade have capacity, if required, to accommodate more casual swimmers. The Grove Theatre will be hosting some of the dance classes as well as some of the children's activities.

Current Dunstable Leisure Centre

As the centre ages, continued customer enjoyment and commercial success is the key management challenge.

Three big events were hosted in December; the Cali r is a music event of Motown, Soul, Reggae and Jazz Funk from the 60's and 70's. At this year's event the 'stylistics' performed with 900 people enjoying the event. At the end of December a church group held a prayer meeting at the Leisure Centre. People attended nationally from Birmingham, Manchester over 3 days; approx.150 attended each day. New

Year's Eve saw an African music event with over 300 attending. A small wrestling event with 100 attendees was held in the sports hall.

There are five 50+ sessions a week including swimming, badminton, gym, bowls and yoga with over a 100 attendees each week. 50+ also arranged a party for attendees on the Thursday before Christmas with over 30 attending.

A popular Aquatic Youth session runs in the pool; a fun swim session with music and some swim instruction. Two swim teachers take this on a Friday night for 8 to 11yrs and 11yrs to 16yrs. A disabled group teaching session with 8 attendees now runs every Thursday night and was added especially for the disabled children who attended Aquatic Youth.

During term time evenings various children's courses run offering dance, ballet, gymnastics, trampoline, free form gym and cheerleading. All the classes are very popular and there are 156 children attending classes every week. There is a gym tots session in the day time.

Dunstable run a very popular GP referral scheme with over 50 sessions being delivered in the month of December. We also have a COPD class with 21 people attending over the month of December. We host the Lifestyle hub which people attend via GP referral. They may have minor health issues either overweight or some mobility problem, they are seen by the coordinator and are offered sessions with the gym staff or referred to slimming clubs, this is funded by the NHS but the centre give the room free of charge.

Health walks continue every Thursday morning. There are two walks on offer. Newcomers and not so fit can opt for a shorter walk around priory gardens. The longer includes part of Dog Kennel Walk. Afterwards the groups return to the Leisure Centre a coffee and socialising. 28 people attended in December and a Christmas lunch was arranged for the group with 17 attending.

On Saturday 14th January, to celebrate the 100th series of Body Pump, 17,500 health clubs all over the WORLD including Dunstable took part in a one day event. We made it a FREE day to our community and current members, anyone over 16 were welcome to take part. The offer included bring a friend for FREE pass for our three Les Mills classes and free refreshments on the day. The day was a great opportunity for our members, local community and even staff members to experience Les Mills classes and maybe classes in general that they have never done before. It provided a good opportunity to share knowledge and create a friendly positive environment where fitness can be fun.

The Leisure Centre took part in the Best Bar None national scheme aimed at making town centres better, safer and more vibrant places to go out.

Licensed premises in Dunstable, Houghton Regis and Leighton-Linslade signed up for the 2016 scheme. The Leisure Centre was the overall winner for Dunstable / Houghton Regis and was runners up in the People's Vote.

3.2 GROVE THEATRE

The 2016 Pantomime was a huge success. 21,292 people passed through our doors to see 52 performances of Aladdin were transported to Peeking on a journey of love and adventure. The genie became a firm favourite with many children and we were able to arrange numerous meet and greets with her and our patrons. The cast embraced Dunstable and the community whilst they were with us, taking part in free workshops for local schools, prize giveaways; charity appearance's and even a light switch on. During the run, we promoted charity bucket collections at the end of each performance, we raised £5,300 for Medical Detection Dogs (our main charity for the run) £250 for Wheelpower (1Life's chosen charity) and £250 for MacMillan. (A local coffee shop was broken into and their charity tin was stolen which was full – we gave our collection to them at their MacMillan Coffee morning to help replace what had been lost.)

In January, we have been able to regroup and put some tender loving care into the theatre after such a busy period. We have had a wonderful Oscar season and seen sold out performances of 'The Girl on the Train', 'Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them' and 'Sully'. We have had a sell-out performance from Ireland's Number One Singer Nathan Carter, a first time in securing this act to come to the Grove.

Our Education Department continues to go from strength to strength, our Grove Academy on a Saturday morning was so successful it has launched an afternoon session also which is getting great attendance. This is an intensive three-hour session concentrating on acting, singing and dance, which works to help young people develop social skills, increase their lung capacity which benefit improves moods and cardio vascular activity which promotes positive body image. Our Mini-Academy programme is aimed at 4-7 year olds and last one and a half hours to prepare them for the progression to the full-blown academy. Our Youth Theatre programme has seen a successful relaunch and now offers the Arts Awards programme where children can earn UCAS points to put towards University applications and support their extra-curricular interests on their CV. We have developed Roald Dahl workshops which we offer out to schools and have been incredibly popular.

Looking to the year ahead we are extremely excited to be planning our 10th Anniversary celebration for April 21st 2017. There will be free education sessions in the morning, High Tea in the afternoon, backstage tours and a party celebration in the evening with a few familiar faces popping up.

The Grove team will also be competing in a Sprint Relay Triathlon, to raise money for Wheelpower and the teams will be competing for a shiny trophy. We are in the process of getting in touch with the Dunstable Rotary as they have strong links with Wheelpower and we will be working hard to fundraise and speak with representatives to come down to the event and adjudicate for us.

We have been lucky enough to be involved with a collaborative project with Central Bedfordshire Council and ROHB – Culture Plus, where 40 vulnerable learners are involved in an Arts Awards programme and alternative routes to express themselves. The Grove are very excited about the exit strategy for the programme, we are looking to be able to assist with setting up to ensure that creative outlets are still available to the young people involved in this project. We are currently investigating what it would involve to host a Fun Palace event in the coming years.

Auditions have taken place for our Grove Production Project this summer, we had a record breaking 97 applicants attend and the call backs have seen a wonderful display of local talent and confirmed the possibility of being able to the double cast this year so that we can offer more chances of a starring role. Join us in August when we follow these talented youngsters down the rabbit whole into 'Alice in Wonderland.'

Our applications for GD1, our in-house dance performance, are now closing and auditions to take part in it will be held in the first week in March. Local schools, groups and troupes will audition and if selected perform in one of the two shows which are hosted at the Grove. This is an amazing event and well supported, we now sell out two nights with this amazing show. Dunstable and the surrounding areas are very lucky to have such amazing talent locally.

- On 21 February, CBC and The Grove Theatre will host 'Inside Out of Mind' a film based on research in dementia care wards, undertaken by the University of Nottingham.
- This screening is based on the play Inside Out of Mind, written by Tanya Myers and based on research in hospital wards for people with dementia led by Justine Schneider.
- This thought provoking and inspirational film aims to:
 - provide an educational opportunity to enable professionals to reflect on current work practices

- raise awareness of the challenges; identify the good aspects and areas for improvement for care and aims to stimulate interest and participation in dementia friendly communities' initiative
- Following the workshop, we will ask all stakeholders to make a pledge to take forward.
 Information will also be available on how each organisation can make a commitment to become a member of the Dementia Action Alliance.

Our Afternoon Teas have become increasingly popular over the last 18 months, this year we are trying a few different takes on this classic idea. There will be a standard event for anyone just wishing to enjoy a relaxing afternoon before going to see a matinee performance and we are also hosting children's themed Teas, making all our events accessible to all ages.

The Grove has seen its database increase from 75,000 to 88,000 in this last year and the positive feedback we get from our loyal customers is incredible. Our customer forums are filled with people who regularly attend and who are so pleased to have such an amazing facility in the local area.

3.3 PHYSICAL ACTIVITY UPDATE

Walking 4 Health: Co-ordinated by BRCC, the free led walks programme continues to operate in the Dunstable area with a number of regular sessions. Current programme includes: -

Walking Football: Walking football has become increasingly popular and is designed to help people keep an active lifestyle, as well as to support getting people back into football who have stopped due to age or injury. Open to all - our regular weekly session in Dunstable takes place each Monday 2-3pm at Beds FA, Skimpot Road, Dunstable.

Price: £1.50 a session.

Priory View 50+ physical activity class: A regular weekly physical activity class now takes place at Priory View every Thursday 2-3pm. Open to the public, the drop in sessions include seated exercise, new age kurling (Kurling is a form of the original curling game, but adapted so that it can be played indoors on any smooth, flat surface, such as a sports hall, rather than on ice) and boccia activities. No need to book, just come along. Sessions cost £2.

3.4 CULTURE PLUS

A project partnering Royal Opera House Bridge to develop a culture and arts project targeting vulnerable learners aged 11 to 18 in Houghton Regis and Dunstable. This two year project will provide a programme of activity for young people referred by social services, schools and partner agencies to provide them with the basic skills and confidence to engage with the arts and cultural provision and gain Arts Award accreditation; boosting self-esteem and providing pathways into other programmes and opportunities. The project will also be used to influence future cultural provision across Central Bedfordshire.

Culture Plus commenced delivery of the pilot stage of the project in October 2016; trialling different artistic and cultural provision with referred young people from Dunstable and Houghton Regis. Pilot workshops are planned to take place in both school and community settings until March. Results of this pilot phase will be used to determine the final format and frequency of the scheme which will commence from April 2017. 30 young people have so far been referred to the programme and many of those will shortly start working towards the Arts Award Bronze certificate.

3.5 COUNTRYSIDE SITES

Totternhoe Steering Group – CBC and the National Trust are working on submitting a bid for funding aimed at engaging with surrounding communities to encourage local residents to walk the Totternhoe Green lanes as part of an active lifestyle.

<u>Dunstable Downs - Chilterns Gateway Centre</u>

Conservation Works - The winter has seen scrub clearance taking place on Dunstable and Whipsnade Downs, a total of around 2ha has been cut by contractors, staff and volunteers.

Overflow Car Park - The overflow car park became unusable three weeks before half-term, as an emergency measure the Trust purchased geo-textile (Terram) and 20mm gravel which was laid by the countryside team and volunteers before the half-term holiday.

Staffing - Two new Rangers have been recruited, Anthony and Holly. Staff and volunteers litter pick daily at Dunstable Downs car parks. The Trust is recruiting seasonal staff to start in time for Easter through to October to support their high season.

Events – The year started with the regular '50 things' event that takes children on an educational experience with one of the rangers. At these events, the children participate in an activity to engage in nature and their surroundings. This was followed by the new regular home school craft sessions at the centre where they made kites. Both Stargazing events where a sell out and lots of positive feedback as to the Astronomers and things learnt by all ages. The Planetarium ran over the first weekend in half term and again sold out teaching nearly 900 people all about the stars.

3.6 DUNSTABLE LIBRARY

Bear's Reading Adventure:

On the 7th December we launched 'Bear's Reading Adventure', this is a Book Trust initiative where preschoolers are given a free sticker book called 'Bear's Reading Adventure', this story book has spaces for little ones to collect 10 stickers from the library. The concept behind the initiative is to encourage family reading and children to visit the library. Each time a child visits they can collect a sticker from a staff member to add to their book. The scheme was also launched at our Library Access Point at the Children's Centre in Downside.

Christmas activities:

Our Christmas activities saw a whole host of events including a special visit from Santa, where the children had the opportunity to read stories with Santa and then receive a special gift. We held a Christmas 'sing-a-long', everyone was invited to come along for a Christmas singsong and enjoy a mince pie too. We had seasonal craft events in the library including: Christmas cracker making, making a snowman, design an Elf and much more.

Chinese New Year

Was celebrated on Saturday 28th January with a special themed day.

Harry Potter Night 2017

2nd February saw us host a Harry Potter Night in the library, this is a national celebration and we hosted our own evening of spells, potion making, cup decorating, owl making and much more. It was a fun magical event.

February half term

A number of events took place including Valentine Card making, asking the children to help us create a display, a fish bowl craft and a superhero craft.

Regular groups:

Our regular groups continue to meet including our Work Club and Coffee Morning Club, and regular information sessions continue including Gateway Housing Support and Smokefree. We have also held a gadget workshop to help customers with new technology such as iPads. Knit and Knatter is ever popular as is our volunteer who helps customers research their family history. Our regular Rhyme times and Crafty Times are continuing, as is our Lego, Mega Blocks and Chatterbooks clubs.

3.7 Looking forward

World Book Day

On Wednesday 1st March we will be hosting a reading of Goldilocks and the Three Bears in conjunction with The Grove Theatre. The event is to celebrate World Book Day (which is 2nd March) and also to promote the library and Theatre. The Grove are kindly sponsoring us with Goody Bags for the children that come along, there will also be craft making and a teddy bear's picnic.

On World Book Day itself we are running a 'hunt the golden ticket' event and children that find the tickets will win a prize.

Dunstable Town Football Club collaboration

As part of its Community School Education and Engagement Project, Dunstable Town will be actively collaborating with local schools and the Library. As part of this initiative, each season the club will select a school to become the DTFC Community School. For 2016-17, this is Totternhoe Lower School. This partnership will take the form of the club providing football training sessions and educational activities for the students. We will be supporting the educational activities and will be running sessions for Totternhoe and other schools during the academic year. Our sessions began this month and we are helping the children to research the history of the football club using the resources that we have available in the library including the Dunstable Gazette that we hold going back to 1883.

We are also hoping to have a community 'call out' to anyone that has memories or memorabilia of the football club that could be brought together to build a permanent exhibition in the library. This project will be ongoing.

4.2 Weight Limits projects

The signage associated with the opening of the A5-M1 Link and Woodside Connection involves changes to more than 500 sign faces across roads within the south of Central Bedfordshire. This programme will take at least two months to complete. The start of works will coincide with the opening of the A5-M1 Link and Woodside Connection as this avoids the costly expense of revisiting sites.

4.3 Woodside Link

The plan is to open the Woodside Link to traffic at the same time as the A5-M1 link. As yet, no opening date has been set by Highways England though the working assumption is that this will happen before the end of March 2017.

4.4 Graham Road

Contractors have been instructed to surface substantial sections of verge along Graham Road. Works are programmed for March 2017. In advance of this CBC, has opened a consultation with local residents to assess the support for making Graham Road one-way. This change would allow the authority to maximise the use of kerb space for on-street parking. A similar consultation on a possible one-way scheme and associated parking improvements is also being considered for Spinney Crescent.

4.5 Guided Busway

The authority is planning to install solar studs along sections of the busway cycleway surfaced in tarmac. Works should take place this Spring. The latest section of the access track to be resurfaced is the one between Duck Bridge and the Station Road access. Should funding permit, this will be followed during March-April 2017 by the section between Station Road and the new Jeans Way bus stop. It is also hoped that the long-promised signage will also be installed along the length of the busway over this period.

4.5 Houghton Road

The recently widened section of footway between Houghton Parade and the entrance to All Saints School will be resurfaced during February-March 2017, resolving issues with ponding and icing.

4.6 High Street Design

A re-design of the public highway within the centre of Dunstable has been commissioned from Ringway Jacobs, taking into account the results of the recent public consultation. As there was support for removing the pedestrian guard railing, it is proposed to arrange this towards the end of the school summer holiday period. This will help minimise the disruption to traffic, albeit cutting into the period of Dunstable's floral displays.

4.7 Prince Regent Area

We have proposals to amend the existing parking restrictions in the Prince Regent area. Objections have been received and these were reported to the Traffic Management Meeting on 28 February 2017 for a decision. If we decide to go ahead the works will take place in late spring/early summer.

4.8 West Parade

We also have proposals to introduce a residents permit parking scheme in West Parade and this is also subject to a decision at the Traffic Management meeting.

4.9 Stuart Street

We are about to start the consultation on a scheme to introduce residents' permit parking in Stuart Street.

5. WASTE

Looking back

We are continuing to work very hard over the last three months clearing up after unauthorised encampments. We have cleared a further 10 encampments from the centre of Dunstable and surrounding areas. The site where a homeless person had been camping in Court Drive has also been cleared.

Key highlights:

We now have some extra street cleansing resource for the centre of Dunstable for a few days each month. They focus on the areas of deeper cleaning which cannot be carried out by the regular operatives.

We are still dealing with very high numbers of suspected abandoned vehicles around Dunstable which we continue to investigate/monitor as necessary.

Key issues:

Dog warden patrols for dog fouling have been carried out in: Bennetts Recreation Ground, Frenches Avenue Recreation Ground, Lancot Drive, Langdale Road, Leighton Court, Spoondell, Staveley Road, West Street and Cemetery and Wingate Road.

Looking forward

The Waste Services Officer for the area continues to monitor recycling collections and educating residents of local flats to increase recycling rates and decrease the proportion of non-recyclable items included.

Garden waste collections resume after the winter suspension the week commencing Monday 27th February or the following week depending on where residents live in Dunstable.

It is our intention to commence urban Grass Cutting as of the week beginning Monday 13th March, weather permitting.

This cutting season Waste Services will be overseeing the highways rural grass cutting contract and queries relating to rural areas can be directed to the team.

Following the success of the 'Clean for the Queen' campaign as part of the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations in March 2016, the Council wants to help mobilise communities across the area once again to take part in 'The Great British Spring Clean' - a nationwide litter pick over 3-5 March 2017.

Hundreds of volunteers helped out at 28 local Clean for the Queen events in Central Bedfordshire, and over 2260kg of rubbish was collected.

This year, all of the UK's litter charities together with local authorities, companies, land managers and other associations have again come together in support of The Great British Spring Clean, which seeks to inspire people to take action and enjoy a few hours together litter-picking to make the places where we live more beautiful.

6. SOCIAL CARE, HEALTH AND HOUSING

6.1 Review of the Day Offer for Older People and Adults with Disabilities

Central Bedfordshire Council would like to improve the day offer for older people and adults with disabilities. The overall aim is to secure better outcomes for our current and future customers whilst delivering better use of Council resources. Since June 2016, the project team have been busy working with customers, family carers, colleagues and external stakeholders to gain feedback and ideas to build up a picture of what good looks like. We have used that feedback to develop proposed overarching key principles and standards which will be used as a foundation for the future day offer across Central Bedfordshire including Dunstable.

The Consultation closed on 23 January 2017. The council are currently reviewing all of the feedback and this paper will form an Appendix to the Executive Report in April. Following final approval the results of the consultation will be made available on the council web page www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/consultations. The project will then move forward to the next phase of implementing the improved day offer across our current services and those the Council commission.

6.2 Adult Social Care Survey

The national Adult Social Care survey has been hitting the door steps of many of our customers through February. A sample of customers across Central Bedfordshire who receive care and support services funded in some way by the Council have been sent the surveys, which will help us to understand the impact our services have on different parts of the person's life. The results will also allow us to measure how satisfied local residents are with services, and the output will inform any changes or improvements to services in the future.

The results will also be shared with the Department of Health to help them to understand the quality of social care services nationally.

Further information about the purpose and use of the survey will be available on the web site soon. We would be glad if you could help by raising awareness of the survey and the value that the data will provide.

7. SCHOOLS

7.1 School Organisation

We are making both middle school sites, Brewers Hill and Streetfield, secure and both will have Guardians in place. We continue to monitor and adjust the forecast for school places required in the towns as a result of the development north of Houghton Regis.

7.2 School Admissions

Parents of children transferring to secondary school in September 2017 will be notified of which school their child is offered a place at on 1 March 2017 (national secondary offer day). Parents of children starting school (Reception Year) or transferring to middle school for September 2017 will be notified of which school they will be attending on the national primary offer day (18 April 2017). Allocation information will be published on these days on the School Admissions webpages of Central Bedfordshire Council's website dealing the level of subscription at Central Bedfordshire schools and academies.

8. YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICES

8.1 Annual Activity Survey

The Youth Support Service has just conducted the Annual Activity Survey to establish the destinations of young people who completed year 11 and year 12 in the summer of 2016. This is a Department for Education requirement. Local Authorities have from September to the end of January to identify young people's current destination. Information on the activity status is sought from institutions in the first instance through enrolment lists. Young people not covered by institutional information or where inadequate information has been obtained are contacted directly by post, telephone, email, social media, home visits by the Youth Support Service and 4YP (our commissioned provided of IAG). The Youth Support Service also works closely with other Local Authorities as 40% of young people who are educated post 16 attend institutions outside Central Bedfordshire.

8.2 Update on NEETs within the wider Central Bedfordshire area

The levels of young people reported as being 'Not in Education, Employment or Training' (NEET) still remains relatively low within Central Bedfordshire. Out of the total Central Bedfordshire school year 12-13 cohort of 5758 young people at the end of January 2017, there were 116 (2.0%) reported to have a NEET status and 5498 (95.4%) recorded as being in 'Education, Employment or Training' (EET). The proportion of young people (School years 12-13) still 'In Learning' increased slightly and is currently at 93.3%. There is a total of 142 (2.5%) young people whose current situation is not known. The 'Annual Activity Survey' has just been completed where the destinations of all years 12s and year 13s have been confirmed.

8.3 NEET Overview for Dunstable

At the end of January 2017 there were 23 young people with a recorded NEET destination. It is normal that the number of NEETs increase at the end of the school/college term and after the Annual Activity Survey.

The overall % proportion of the Dunstable population aged school years 12-13 who are currently NEET is currently 2.8%.

8.4 Characteristics of the NEET Group in Dunstable:

The following information provides an overview of the characteristics of the current NEET group in relation to young people aged 16-18 (school years 12-13). Where relevant, the tables include the figures for two other areas enabling a comparison to be made if required.

(1) Area

The Dunstable-Central ward is the only ward in Central Bedfordshire having a zero total for the number of recorded NEET young people. Dunstable-Northfields has the highest number of NEET young people living in its area and is currently registering 11 young people with that characteristic.

The following table gives a break down of the NEETs recorded as living within each ward at the end of January 2017.

(6) Unknown Destinations

13 (1.6%) young people in the area have a recorded destination of 'Unknown'. 1 young person was reported to have left the area whilst the remaining 12 could not be contacted using the information held by the service. Destinations are only made 'Cannot be Contacted' when the service has attempted at least 3 telephone calls; including 1 during the evening, letter, email, text message, Facebook search, a home visit during the day, as well as cross referencing with the Tribal, National Learner Records and Mosiac database systems.

9. POLLUTION AND LICENSING

Unity Night Club – Premises Licence has now been granted with conditions from Police & Public Protection included. It is currently expected to open at some point in March. There was a recent

fire in the building which has been investigated by the fire service and attributed to third parties unknown.

Prestige Express – Have appealed against the decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee to refuse to grant their application for a 24/7 licence to sell alcohol. The preliminary hearing was on Tuesday 31st January and we are awaiting a date for the full appeal hearing at Luton Magistrate's Court.

10. PUBLIC HEALTH

Specific Public Health delivered and commissioned interventions taking place in Dunstable include:

10.1 NHS Health Checks

NHS Health Checks are being delivered through 9 of the 10 Chiltern Vale GP Practices to eligible residents, aged 40-74 years. From 1st April 2016 to 31st January 2017, 2.715 Chiltern Vale residents were offered an NHS Health Check and 1,542 were completed. Following the completed Health Checks within this period, 31 people were newly diagnosed with hypertension, 47 were prescribed statins and 6 were newly diagnosed with type 2 diabetes.

10.2 Obesity And Excess Weight

Levels of obesity and excess weight are high across Dunstable compared to other wards within CBC. To support a reduction in child and adult weight levels, and raise levels of physical activity, there have been a number of services commissioned to deliver interventions.

Data

Obesity data shows that the average level of obesity in adults for Dunstable Central, Dunstable Icknield, Dunstable Manshead, Dunstable Northfields, Dunstable Watling, Caddington and Eaton Bray wards is 25.28%. (CB average – 23.7%)

Excess weight data from the National Child Measurement Programme for children age 4-5yrs old within the same wards shows the average level for excess weight is 21.5%. (CB average – 20%)

Excess weight data from the National Child Measurement Programme for children age 10-11yrs old within the same wards shows the average level for excess weight is 26.3%. (CB average – 28.7%)

10.3 Commissioned Services

- BeeZee Bodies Weight Management programmes for young children (HENRY), families (BeeZee Families), men (Gutless) and pregnant women (BeeZee Bumps)
 - ➤ In Q2 there were 2 HENRY programmes which ran in Leighton Buzzard and Dunstable. Both these programme included referrals from families who live in Dunstable.
 - > 1 BeeZee Families programme ran in Dunstable which included referrals from families who live in Dunstable as well as surrounding wards.
 - ➤ BeeZee Bodies also commission Weight Watchers and Slimming World via the GPs. All the GPs in Houghton Regis use this referral programme for adults who are overweight or obese.
 - 2 Gutless programmes have run in Dunstable since April 2016.
 - > SW/WW (waiting for BZBs figures)

- ➤ BeeZee Bumps Maternal Obesity programme is working with midwives to refer women who are overweight and deliver at the L&D.
- Bike It 7 schools in Dunstable are engaged with the 'Bike It' programme delivered by Sustrans, to increase physical activity and raise the number of pupils who are able to cycle/scoot to and from school safely. This also includes work with school staff and families.
- Oral Health Promotion As Dunstable is one of the areas within the most deprived in CB, Community Dental Services were commissioned to deliver several programmes from April 2016 – March 2018.
 - Fluoride Varnish application to 3year olds to decrease levels of tooth decay in young children. Working with Childrens Centres and Early Years settings.
 - ➤ Healthy Smiles programme for 2 4 year olds, 9 nurseries and Early Years settings were offered the programme and 4 accepted.
 - ➤ Life Long Smiles programme for elderly care settings was offered to 6 settings but only 2 showed an interest but they will all be contacted again in 2017.
- Food Award Scheme Funding from Public health has been secured to introduce a Food Award Scheme. Working with Environmental Health, a new officer will contact food businesses to support them to reduce the levels of fat, salt and sugar in food served. The award will initially be offered to Leisure Centre cafes and Hot Food Takeaways in areas of high levels of excess weight.

10.4 Looking forward

Obesity and Excess Weight

- A new Gutless programme began in the Dunstable area in the middle of January 2017.
- The Food Award Scheme will be offered to the café at the Dunstable Downs Visitor Centre as part of the Healthier Options Scheme.
- 'Bike It' funding has been secured until March 2018 and new schools will be offered the chance to engage in the programme.
- Oral Health programme will focus on completing the Fluoride Varnish programme in 2017/18 and delivering a Supervised Toothbrushing Programme to Early Years settings and primary schools in the most 20% deprived areas of CBC which include Dunstable.

11. PARTNERSHIPS AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

11.1 Town and Parish Council Conference

The latest Town and Parish Council Conference was held on Wednesday 22 February, at Priory House, Chicksands.

The theme for the event was 'Emergency Planning'. The presentation and post conference report will be available on our website shortly.

11.2 Section 106 Community Facilities grant scheme

Details of the proposed grant scheme- criteria, guidance and an application form are attached with the papers for this meeting.

11.3 Cheering Volunteering

The third annual Cheering Volunteering awards and celebration event will be held during National Volunteers Week, on Tuesday 6 June at the Grove Theatre in Dunstable.

Having grown in success and popularity over the past two years, Cheering Volunteering is organised by the council, working in partnership with volunteer centres as part of Central Bedfordshire Together, to say thank you to those who give their time to help others.

The event is sponsored by Biffa, Aragon Housing, Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue Service, ProLogis and Jeakins Weir.

This year there will again be seven awards, six of which you can submit nominations for. There will also be a Panel's Choice Award, where the selection panel will choose a winner and two highly-commended nominees from all of the nominations received.

Nominations are now open and the easiest way to do this is by using the <u>online nomination form</u> on the council website. Alternatively, you can visit the website to complete a Word or PDF version of the form.

'Inspiring Volunteering' is the Cheering Volunteering small grants scheme, set up to assist voluntary and community organisations to encourage volunteering.

A total funding pot of £5,000 has been secured to be spent on local voluntary and community sector community projects. Grant awards will be made from a minimum of £100 to a maximum of £1,000.

Applications for financial assistance can be made by any group or organisation, providing that the project they wish to spend the money on is located within Central Bedfordshire and/or will support primarily the residents of Central Bedfordshire. Deadline 7 April. For more information click here.
