Purpose of report: -	The purpose of this report is to provide performance results for the town
	centre in 2016/17 against the agreed suite of performance indicators and to
	update Members on progress relating to ongoing town centre priorities. The
	report also makes proposals for projects to be funded for 2017/18.

1. ACTION RECOMMENDED

- 1.1 That the Committee note results against the agreed suite of performance indicators for the town centre in 2016/17 and progress on any ongoing actions.
- 1.2 That Members consider and prioritise actions to be funded for 2017/18 as set out in paragraph 4.2 below.
- 1.3 That the Committee delegates authority to the Committee Chairman, in liaison with the Town Clerk and Chief Executive and Head of Partnerships and Community Engagement to approve relevant expenditure from the allocated finances for the Committee in 2017/18 once projects/initiatives have been fully costed.

2. INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 As Members will be aware, this Committee was allocated £30,155.63 for 2016/17 from Central Bedfordshire Council and Dunstable Town Council for the delivery of town centre improvement initiatives. A total of £27,100 was allocated for Committee priorities which were formed into an Action Plan.
- 2.2 Attached at appendix 1 is an updated Dunstable Joint Committee Action Plan for 2016/17 and expenditure breakdown for 2016/17 is attached at appendix 2.

3. UPDATE ON ONGOING TOWN CENTRE ACTIONS

3.1 As can be seen from the Action Plan, the majority of projects funded from the 2016/17 budget have now been completed. However, there are some items that are ongoing, such as those that will be completed following the detrunking of the A5, and there are some additional priorities that have been funded from previous budgets and these are detailed below:

4. ANTICIPATED BUDGET FOR 2017/18 AND SUGGESTED ACTIONS

- 4.1 It is anticipated that the Committee will have the following financial resources available for 2017/18, subject to confirmation and excluding projects already prioritised by the Committee:
 - £ 8,357.96 Anticipated Underspend and unallocated funds from 2016/2017 budget
 - £ 4,813.36 Remaining funds from 2016/17 Special Saturdays Initiative
 - £ 5,000.00 Dunstable Town Council contribution (town centre marketing budget)
 - £ 11,412.13 ASDA Section 106 funding contribution following adoption of the Committee Terms of Reference*
 - £ 29,583.45 Estimated Budget available for 2017/18
 - *The Asda Section 106 funding contribution for 2017/18 is subject to confirmation and expenditure of these funds is contingent on their receipt.
- 4.2 The table below sets out a range of suggested initiatives that the Committee may wish officers to investigate and determine detailed costs for. Members of the Committee are also encouraged to make further suggestions. Any agreed actions will serve to update the Committee action plan for 2017/18. Members will also note that recommendation 1.3 of this report requests delegated approval to the Committee Chairman in liaison with the Town Clerk and Chief Executive and Head of Partnerships and Community Engagement, to approve expenditure once full costs are known for agreed initiatives.

- 5.2.3 Eleanor's Cross, Ashton Square, Albion Street, The Quadrant and Grove Park (including Asda) have been included but rates can be calculated with or without these properties.
- 5.2.4 These figures have been shared with Central Bedfordshire Council officers and more detail of the vacancy rates across Central Bedfordshire Council is given at agenda item 9.

Notes

There were a total of 31 arrests made as a result of information supplied to the police in the period of this report.

Incidents of driving offences and anti social behaviour continue to be a problem in the area of the Skate Park and Grove Theatre Car Park.

Incidents of littering offences are increasing in the White Lion Retail Park car parks and in the area of the Skate Park. Any incidents recorded are passed to CBC Environmental Protection Officers for investigation and the issue of Fixed Penalty Notices.

2. REGENERATION & BUSINESS

2.1 Business Support

The Business Growth Team offers a range of support services across the area, including funded projects, direct support and referrals to strategic partners, as well as a strong marketing

campaign to provide businesses with relevant information. An important part of the team's role is also providing a gateway for businesses to benefit from the wider services of Central Bedfordshire Council.

The team has dealt with 5 direct enquiries from Dunstable the last quarter and expect enquiries to increase following the distribution of a flyer sent out with the Annual Business Rates bill.



2.2 Business TimeBank

The Council's Business TimeBank is a free scheme whereby local experts of their field have volunteered to offer start-up/small businesses up to two hours of support and advice.

Any local business can make use of this scheme and gain some expert guidance from any of our providers, including solicitors, accountants, business coaches, marketing agencies and intellectual property experts.

2.3 Creative Bedfordshire Events

Central Bedfordshire Council sponsor and support the Creative Bedfordshire monthly events to nurture and develop the creative industry. Individuals that work in the arts, run a creative business, are a freelance artist, actor, producer, maker or musician (or commission them), or are just curious, this would be a beneficial network to tap into.

2.4 Innovation Bridge

Innovation Bridge is now up and running offering support to businesses across the region who are seeking university expertise and grants to deliver growth and innovation. Innovation Bridge is a three-year business support project worth nearly £4m, running until summer 2019 offering access to:

- Three days of FREE academic support to help develop an action plan for developing a new product or service
- Grants of between £1,000 and £15,000

2.5 <u>Velocity Growth Hub</u>

The Business Support Team continues to maximise opportunities of Velocity (a business support programme delivered by SEMLEP) by promoting the offer locally through our marketing and publicity.

2.6 Inward Investment

There have been 19 enquiries for vacant units on the Woodside and Houghton Regis Estates since January 2017. The team managed a total of 190 Inward Investment enquiries for 2016-17 which surpassed our target of 150. Out of the 18 successes, 9 of these were for the Dunstable area, bringing more than 1,000 jobs

Kombimatec Machines Ltd have announced plans to relocate to Eastern Avenue, Dunstable from Luton before the end of March to support their expansion plans, hoping to create an additional 6 jobs in the next 3 years. Kombimatec manufactures and supplies machinery for processing UPVC (PVC-u) and Aluminium profiles in the fabrication of window, door, conservatory, roof, curtain walling, and shop fronts worldwide.

Team Sport, an indoor go-karting facility has announced plans to open in Verey Road, on the Woodside Industrial Estate. CBC teams supported this relocation and will be helping to organise the recruitment programme for the 40 jobs at this site. The company hope to be fully operational by June.

2.7 Be Central Bedfordshire website (www.becentralbedfordshire.co.uk) continues to attract interest from potential investors with 10,000 visits to the site and more than 1000 property searches since 1st April 2016, with Houghton Regis and Dunstable featuring prominently. The team have launched Twitter and Linked In accounts to further attract website traffic @BeCentralBeds, https://www.linkedin.com/company/becentralbeds

The Business Investment Team continues to manage the Business Support & Growth Fund, providing a range of support to inward investors or expanding business, through awards of up to £5k of business rates discounts, public protection training or pre application planning advice. The Fund is a great success with the year so far providing 6 awards totalling £20,100, which has facilitated 42 new jobs, and £231k new investment. Three of these awards were to Dunstable and Houghton Regis businesses, which will lead to 22 new jobs for the area. 2.8 Employment and Skills

Using money from the Skills Funding Agency, CBC's Bedfordshire Employment & Skills Service (BESS) continues to provide support for local residents to increase their employability. Considerable emphasis is placed on reaching local residents who live in deprived areas, many of whom may have a range of needs.

The BESS 'offer' consists of training courses provided by the in-house Direct Delivery team and a growing number of external providers.

The external providers include:

- Impact Peer Support who continues to provide excellent courses aimed at residents who have mild to moderate mental health difficulties. Feedback from participants has been excellent and for some it has been life changing.
- Noah Enterprise (Luton based) who are delivering courses aimed at those furthest away from the labour market through homelessness or who are recovering from addiction. The courses include ESOL and IT.
- TCHC offer a range of courses including IT, Social Media and Understanding Enterprise. Some of the courses are especially attractive for residents considering self employment.
- Voluntary Community Action (South Beds) deliver a range of Step-Into courses include (amongst others) Customer Service & Retail, Health & Social Care, Warehousing & Distribution. These are short courses and designed to provide a 'taster' into specific sectors
- SSG have recently delivered a First Aid at Work course at the Incuba. This is an
 example of positive collaboration with the Council's housing team where the learners
 included a number of CBC tenants. The take-up rate was very good and further courses
 are planned in order to meet demand. We believe First Aid is a helpful employability skill
 which will also be a very useful 'life skill'.

Since the last update BESS has engaged three new providers who will be delivering a range of courses in the Dunstable and Houghton Regis area. These are:

My Healthy Lifestyle CIC – Food Hygiene. This is an accredited course delivered over two days.

Hill McManus Ltd – Hospitality & Catering, Retail Operations, ICT and Warehousing & Storage Principles. These are all accredited courses.

Be Positive - Employability to improve a range of work related skills and is also accredited.

The BESS team has some new pages on the Council's website. These are a useful resource and explain the courses on offer in greater detail and there is an on-line enquiry facility. http://www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/jobs/adult-learning/about/courses.aspx

The 'offer' is complete by the availability of Information, Advice & Guidance on a 1:1 basis for residents seeking advice on careers and local jobs.

2.9 High Street Vacancy Levels

As part of the ongoing monitoring of the Economic Development Plan the Council is monitoring the level of high street vacancies in 'A' class premises in Central Bedfordshire's town centres. The overall average vacancy rate within town centres that have been monitored to date is 6.1% in February 2017. This has increased from the 4.4% in November 2016, although there are still 3 counts to be made. Biggleswade and Houghton Regis have seen an increase in vacant units, with a decrease being seen in Dunstable. Dunstable still remains the town with the most vacancies, 33 or 13.4% of all premises, but it is good to note that 4 recently vacant units are currently under development for tenants. Central Bedfordshire's vacancy rate is lower than Britain's rate of 12.2% in February 2016 (Source: The Local Data Company).

2.10 Market Town Regeneration Fund

CBC continues to support Dunstable Town Council in its delivery of its MTRF bid and its engagement with the High Street Improvement Scheme (HSIS). Within the HSIS, 12 businesses are going through the final review stage, and will be scored by a CBC and Dunstable Town Council panel. These now include The Old Sugar Loaf, Pizza Roma, Saracens Head and lower floor of the old Royal Mail building. Once approved, the final shop front designs and costings will be confirmed (subject to planning). The tender for the building contractor to create the new shopfronts will be completed in the next few months, with works anticipated to begin late summer.

3. LEISURE, LIBRARIES & COUNTRYSIDE

3.1 DUNSTABLE LEISURE CENTRE

Exciting Future for Dunstable Leisure Centre...

We are moving ever closer to the redevelopment of Dunstable Leisure Centre in a major move that will provide modern facilities to help residents lead healthier lifestyles. The new centre will offer the local community a greater range of services all under one roof. These include:

- A new, state-of-the-art leisure facility, with a bigger health and fitness suite, plus swimming pools and sports activities for all ages and abilities
- A brand-new, bigger library, relocated from Vernon Place
- New crèche
- New, bigger café
- * A flexible community space for other public and community services, such as the Citizens Advice, Adult Day Care and disabled sports.

The current leisure centre and library are no longer fit for purpose or cost effective to run as both require substantial improvements. By bringing services together, the new centre will be more flexible and accessible for all residents, with improved opening hours for public services. This will make a significant positive impact on people's lives, encourage new audiences to be active and strengthen Dunstable as a great place to live and work.

Next steps for Dunstable Leisure Centre...

In order to undertake a redevelopment of this magnitude, the decision has been made to close the existing Dunstable Leisure Centre from **Sunday 4th June 2017 at 9pm**. This is so that the construction and rebuilding of the centre can progress quickly and safely. The expected reopening date will be during winter 2018/19.

3.2 GROVE THEATRE

When the Leisure Centre closes in the summer, the Grove will be hosting a range of the activities such as Toddler Gym, Baby Ballet and Pilates so that the local community do not lose out during the renovation period.

We are currently working on developing our links with local schools in the Dunstable Area, we have established links with Lark Rise and we are currently working with Lancot Challenger Academy to look at taking Arts Awards classes into the school to help them work towards becoming Arts Mark schools.

On 21st April we will be celebrating the Grove's 10th Anniversary. Events during the day are:

- 9.30am 3.30pm free education classes, drama and performing arts sessions
- free Disco Duck sessions
- Noon High Tea opened by a special VIP
- 7.30pm 10th Anniversary Celebration evening party. The proceeds from the evening will be donated to our charity. With performances from our 2016 panto stars Kieran and Sarah from Britain's Got Talent, and music from The Blue Rinse band.

Various workshops ran over the half term and Easter Period, daily crafting, dance, acting and singing workshops and three day musical performance workshops where a group of 4 - 15 year olds learnt a short 15 minute musical, created costumes, choreographed and performed it to the parents after 2.5 days.

Applications for the outstanding in house production GD1 have closed and auditions have now taken place. We have 22 local dance schools/companies taking part and the project is now so successful it spans two performance nights and we are looking at the possibility of a third. We are also looking at developing Grove Sings in 2018, to offer another forum to the local community.

Our Afternoon Teas have become increasingly popular over the last 18 months, this year we are trying a few different takes on this classic idea. There will be a standard event for anyone just wishing to enjoy a relaxing afternoon before going to see a matinee performance and we are also hosting children's themed Teas, making all our events accessible to all ages.

The Grove has seen its database increase from 83,000 to 88,000 in this last four months and the positive feedback we get from our loyal customers is incredible. Our customer forums are filled with people who regularly attend and who are so pleased to have such an amazing facility in the local area.

3.3 PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Walking Football continues every Monday 2-3pm at Beds FA, Skimpot Road, Dunstable and our weekly 50+ class physical activity class at Priory View every Thursday at 2pm continues to be popular, open to the general public with no booking required.

4. HIGHWAYS

5. WASTE

Looking back

Key highlights:

We are still dealing with very high numbers of suspected abandoned vehicles around Dunstable. Waste Services Officers will inspect vehicles reported as abandoned and, based upon a number of factors, sticker the vehicle only if they consider it as potentially abandoned. If at the point of inspection the Officer does not consider the vehicle to be potentially abandoned no further action will be taken at that time.

Only once a sticker has been affixed by the Officer inspecting the vehicle are we able to commence our investigation as to its status.

If a vehicle is claimed during our investigation then we cannot continue to consider it as potentially abandoned and it will not be possible to remove it.

The Great British Spring Clean event took place over the first weekend in March and over 200 bags of rubbish were collected in Central Beds including 92 from Dunstable. There were over 50 litter-picking events and over 600 local volunteers took part across Central Beds. Keep

Britain Tidy reported that 513,060 bags of rubbish and more than 303,125 volunteers took part in the event country-wide and cleared more than 1,500 tonnes of litter.

Key issues:

Dog warden patrols for dog fouling have been carried out in: Bennetts Recreation Ground, Britain Street, Frenches Avenue Recreation Ground, Leighton Court, Spoondell, Staveley Road and Wingate Road.

Looking forward

The Waste Services Officer for the area continues to monitor recycling collections and educating residents of local flats to increase recycling rates and decrease the proportion of non-recyclable items included.

The garden waste collected since the service resumed at the end of February/beginning of March has shown a higher than usual content of incorrect items, including black bags of domestic waste, food stuff, plastic buckets, metal springs, garden tools, paperwork, ring binders and general, not green, non compostable items. All garden waste that is collected at the kerbside is processed at a local composting site and non-compostable items can cause issues, meaning some garden waste cannot be composted. If residents are unsure, there are details on our website: http://www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/waste/recycling/garden.aspx

For clarification, items which can be put in the green waste are: grass cuttings, plants and weeds, flowers, pruning's, hedge clippings, leaves and bark, vase plants and pond plants. Items which should <u>not</u> be put in the green waste collections are: vegetable peelings, kitchen waste, plastic bags, plant pots, polystyrene trays, soil, rubble, animal bedding, pet waste and general household waste.

This cutting season Waste Services will be overseeing the highways rural grass cutting contract (outside the speed limits of towns and villages) and queries relating to rural areas can be directed to Marie Bedborough 07342 091539.

6. SOCIAL CARE, HEALTH AND HOUSING

6.1 Review of the Day Offer for Older People and Adults with Disabilities

Central Bedfordshire Council approved the decision to provide a more personalised and improved Day Offer for older people and adults with disabilities.

The decision aims to secure better outcomes for current and future customers and follows an extensive period of consultation and engagement with those who use the service. All of the feedback received by the Council and our responses can be found on the Council's website along with the full report that was considered by the Council's Executive. Building on this work, the Council will start to conduct reviews of the services offered at each centre and the needs of its current and future customers. It plans to work closely with customers, their carers and staff to develop options together. These will include opportunities for customers to receive more individual services and for those services to be more integrated with other community facilities.

6.2 Inside Out of Mind

Central Bedfordshire Council continues to strive to improve services and support to people with dementia and their carers.

On Tuesday 21st February 2017 Central Bedfordshire Council and the Grove Theatre had great pleasure in hosting 'Inside Out of Mind' a recording of a deeply touching and unique play about life on a dementia ward from the perspective of the patients, staff and visitors undertaken by the University of Nottingham.

The screening based on the play Inside Out of Mind, written by Tanya Myers and based on research in hospital wards for people with dementia led by Justine Schneider.

Cllr Hegley, Executive Member for Adults & Children's Social Care & Housing, Chairman, Dunstable Joint Committee, Member for Dunstable Central Ward opened this truly exciting educational opportunity, where we were joined by over 100 people including carers, Councillors and a range of staff from care homes, GP practices, NHS services, housing, social services, learning & development and library services, care agencies and a range of voluntary sector providers.

The film was followed by a facilitated discussion. The morning highlighted the challenges of person-centred dementia care and also recognised the many factors which influence our working environments. It looked at how it feels to be a person with dementia, and how it feels to care for people who are affected.

The event was also supported by information stands from Aragon Housing, Healthwatch, Carers in Bedfordshire, and Tibbs Dementia Foundation.

6.3 Just Ask

Central Bedfordshire Council are working in partnership with Healthwatch Central Bedfordshire, Aragon Housing and their residents group (ROAR) and the Bedfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group to host this year's Just Ask.

The roadshows run between April and October throughout the Central Bedfordshire area and goes out into the community to take information and advice to a wider and often hard to reach audience.

The aim of the project is to give residents the chance to find out more about a wealth of topics including social care, health, housing and many additional services like Public Protection and Trading standards.

There is a schedule of activity which you can find here

The 'Just Ask' project started its journey on 7th April where it visited Asda in Dunstable. There was a broad demographic of attendees on the day with over 234 people visiting. A range of enquiries included:

- Bus timetable/travel information.
- Financial 'Struggling for Money' leaflet.
- Adult education course information was popular, with maths and IT being the most requested.
- Financial information about pensions, selling a home and will making.
- Carers information general and for people who care for someone with a mental health issue
- How to get housing with a local social housing provider.
- Blue Badge queries
- Both Mental Health and older people queries were the most common at the visit

6.4 Opening of Priory View

The council's flagship independent living scheme, Priory View, was officially opened on 11th April by HM The Queen. Her Majesty was accompanied by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh at the council's independent living scheme in Dunstable.

HM The Queen and His Royal Highness visited the home of resident Pauline Stainsby – one of the 83 state-of-the-art apartments at Priory View – during a tour of the building, and Her Majesty also had the chance to speak with other residents taking part in some of the numerous activities on offer.

Following lunch with dignitaries, residents and invited guests, Her Majesty officially opened the building before she and The Duke of Edinburgh were presented with a posy and a gift by Priory View's oldest residents George Baker, a former Royal Navy serviceman, and Angela Greene.

7. SCHOOLS

7.1 School Admissions

Parents of children starting school (Reception Year) or transferring to middle school for September 2017 were notified on 18 April (national primary offer day) of which school their child has been offered a place. Across Central Bedfordshire 95% of pupils were offered their first preference school. 7.2 School Organisation

We continue to monitor and adjust the forecast for school places required in the towns as a result of the development north of Houghton Regis

8. YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICES

Local authorities have a duty to track the destinations of young people aged 16 and 17 year olds in their area with a view to ensuring that they engage in some form of education or training until at least their 18th birthday (end of school year 13). Tracking is achieved by utilising various means such as telephone calls, letter, email, text message, Facebook, home visits and the use of various database systems such as Tribal, National Learner Records and Mosiac.

Update on NEETs within the wider Central Bedfordshire area

Within the wider Central Bedfordshire school year 12-13 cohort at the end of March 2017, there were a total of 5767 of young people recorded by the service. Of these there were 116 (2.0%) reported to have a NEET status and 5479 (95%) recorded as being in 'Education, Employment or Training' (EET). The proportion of young people (School years 12-13) still 'In Learning' is currently at 92.8%. There are 170 young people whose current situation is not currently known. This value includes the 20 who were tracked but refused to supply any information and 115 that could not be contacted using various means available to the service.

NEET Overview for Dunstable

At the end of March 2017 there were 27 young persons with a recorded NEET destination which is a slight increase from the 23 at the end of January 2017.

The overall % proportion of the Dunstable population aged school years 12-13 who are currently record with a NEET destination is 3.2% (January=2.8%).

Characteristics of the NEET Group in Dunstable:

The following information provides an overview of the characteristics of the current NEET group in relation to young people aged 16-18 *(school years 12-13)*. Where relevant, the tables include the figures for two other areas enabling a comparison to be made if required.

(1) Area

The Dunstable-Central ward remains the only ward in Central Bedfordshire having a zero total for the number of recorded NEET young people. Dunstable-Northfields still has the highest number of NEET young people living in its area and is currently registering 10 young persons with that characteristic but this is a decrease from 11 recorded in the January report.

9. LICENSING AND POLLUTION

- Prestige Express, Dunstable Appeal against decision of Licensing Sub-committee to refuse to allow licence to sell alcohol on 24/7 basis. We are awaiting preliminary case management hearing to set date for full hearing of appeal in the magistrate's court.
- McDonalds undergoing refurbishment. Closed until end of April (approx.)
- New premises licence application received for Go Karting for Fun at Unit 27, Verey Road, Dunstable
- Poynters News, Poynters Road, Dunstable have applied to extend their hours for sale of alcohol until 02.00.

Box U Fit, Katherine Drive, Dunstable – a fitness studio has set up apparently without planning permission and is causing noise issues. After investigating the noise complaints further, we have served a noise abatement notice but are currently awaiting a response from Planning Enforcement as to what action they propose to take in the matter.

10. PUBLIC HEALTH

Specific Public Health delivered and commissioned interventions taking place in Dunstable include:

10.1 NHS Health Checks

The NHS Health Check programme aims to prevent heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes and kidney disease, and raise awareness of dementia, both across the population and within high risk and vulnerable groups. NHS Health Checks are being delivered through 9 of the 10 Chiltern Vale GP Practices to eligible residents, aged 40-74 years. From 1st April 2016 to 28th February 2017, 2,967 Chiltern Vale residents were offered an NHS Health Check and 1,744 were completed, this equates to 77% of target delivery. Following the completed Health Checks within this period, 39 people were newly diagnosed with hypertension, 59 were newly prescribed statins and 7 were newly diagnosed with type 2 diabetes.

10.2 Obesity And Excess Weight

Levels of obesity and excess weight are high across Dunstable compared to other wards within CBC. To support a reduction in child and adult weight levels, and raise levels of physical activity, there have been a number of services commissioned to deliver interventions.

Data

Obesity data shows that the average level of obesity in adults for Dunstable Central, Dunstable Icknield, Dunstable Manshead, Dunstable Northfields, Dunstable Watling, Caddington and Eaton Bray wards is 25.28%. (CB average – 23.7%)

Excess weight data from the National Child Measurement Programme for children age 4-5yrs old within the same wards shows the average level for excess weight is 21.5%. (CB average – 20%)

Excess weight data from the National Child Measurement Programme for children age 10-11yrs old within the same wards shows the average level for excess weight is 26.3%. (CB average – 28.7%)

10.3 Commissioned Services

 BeeZee Bodies – Weight Management programmes for young children (HENRY), families (BeeZee Families), men (Gutless) and pregnant women (BeeZee Bumps)

- ➢ In Q2 there were 2 HENRY programmes which ran in Leighton Buzzard and Dunstable. Both these programme included referrals from families who live in Dunstable.
- > 1 BeeZee Families programme ran in Dunstable which included referrals from families who live in Dunstable as well as surrounding wards.
- ➤ BeeZee Bodies also commission Weight Watchers and Slimming World via the GPs. All the GPs in Houghton Regis use this referral programme for adults who are overweight or obese.
- > 2 Gutless programmes have run in Dunstable since April 2016.
- > SW/WW (waiting for BZBs figures)
- ➢ BeeZee Bumps Maternal Obesity programme is working with midwives to refer women who are overweight and deliver at the L&D.
- Bike It 7 schools in Dunstable are engaged with the 'Bike It' programme delivered by Sustrans, to increase physical activity and raise the number of pupils who are able to cycle/scoot to and from school safely. This also includes work with school staff and families.
- Oral Health Promotion As Dunstable is one of the areas within the most deprived in CB, Community Dental Services were commissioned to deliver several programmes from April 2016 – March 2018.
 - > Fluoride Varnish application to 3year olds to decrease levels of tooth decay in young children. Working with Childrens Centres and Early Years settings.
 - ➤ Healthy Smiles programme for 2 4 year olds, 9 nurseries and Early Years settings were offered the programme and 4 accepted.
 - > Life Long Smiles programme for elderly care settings was offered to 6 settings but only 2 showed an interest but they will all be contacted again in 2017.
- Food Award Scheme Funding from Public health has been secured to introduce a
 Food Award Scheme. Working with Environmental Health, a new officer will contact food
 businesses to support them to reduce the levels of fat, salt and sugar in food served. The
 award will initially be offered to Leisure Centre cafes and Hot Food Takeaways in areas
 of high levels of excess weight.

10.4 Looking forward

Obesity and Excess Weight

- A new Gutless programme began in the Dunstable area in the middle of January 2017.
- The Food Award Scheme will be offered to the café at the Dunstable Downs Visitor Centre as part of the Healthier Options Scheme.
- 'Bike It' funding has been secured until March 2018 and new schools will be offered the chance to engage in the programme.
- Oral Health programme will focus on completing the Fluoride Varnish programme in 2017/18 and delivering a Supervised Toothbrushing Programme to Early Years settings and primary schools in the most 20% deprived areas of CBC which include Dunstable.
- **10.5 Stop Smoking Services** are delivered across all GP Surgeries in Dunstable and Houghton Regis.

A Hambling Seedling, propagated in the late 1800's by Col William Hambling of Chews House, is being planted in West St Cemetery near the Hambling family plot, other Hambling seedling apple trees have been allocated to other sites in order to keep the species prospering in it's home town of Dunstable.

Our launch event for the 2017 bid to Anglia In Bloom was held on April 25th at Southwood Road where the local Residents Association have converted a neglected roundabout into a splendid drought garden. Drain pipes and kerb stones were donated by Carillion from the site of the new Woodside and M1 link roads, hauled into place and painted by residents from the area, Dunstable In Bloom have donated some funds to help with the planting – another new site to show the judges when they visit in the summer.

3. DETAILED CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 The Risk Log for the Dunstable Joint Committee is updated on an annual basis and new risks identified as and when they emerge.
- 3.2 The Risk Log attempts to identify the main strategic risks facing the Dunstable Joint Committee and what interventions are currently in place in order to contain and minimise the risks.
- 3.3 Each identified risk has been given a risk rating multiplied by the likely probability of the risk happening. The same process is then undertaken to determine the residual risk once interventions have taken place.
- 3.4 The result is each risk is given a residual rating from 4 to 16 where 16 is high and 4 is low.
- 3.5 In most cases the identified risks have been given a residual risk rating of either 8 (medium) or 4 (low). In these cases the risk simply has to continue to be managed or minor interventions still need to be taken. When a risk is identified as higher than 8 then further actions will be required to bring the risk rating down.
