



#### Dunstable's Town Team Improving Ashton Square

As regular readers will have noted in our last edition, since December, Dunstable's Town Team has been working hard to bring improvements to the Ashton Square area of the town centre, with the ultimate aim of increasing trade and footfall for traders.



Consisting of community groups, shops and representatives from Central Bedfordshire Council and Central Bedfordshire College, and led by Dunstable Town Council, the partnership has been building on its early success, with further improvements including:

- A retail map to replace the old mural in the alleyway
- Installation of vinyls to tidy up empty shop units
- Successful Easter and St George's Day activities

You may have noticed that some of the empty units in High Street South have also benefited from new vinyls, for which funding was provided by the Dunstable Joint Committee.

The next phase of improvements are to include:

- A new sign for Ashton Square
- Refurbishing of street furniture
- Installation of hanging baskets
- A new map for the Ashton Square Car Park notice board
- Further community events, activities and performances

The Town Team wants to see The Square being used by the local community, creating a vibrant community feel.

## Priory House Tea Rooms

The Tea Room at Priory House has again been awarded membership of the prestigious Tea Guild for 2013 and remains the only holder of membership to the Guild in Bedfordshire.

In addition to this the Tea Room has won an "Award of Excellence" by the United Kingdom Tea Council as part of their highly coveted Top Tea Place Awards 2013.

Now in its 28th year, the awards are considered the Michelin star of the tea world, with the best tea venues in Britain competing for recognition of outstanding quality and consistently high standards in tea service. Judging is based on visits by judges to take Afternoon Tea. All visits are anonymous to ensure the results are completely fair and accurate.

The judges awarded points for the variety, flavour and knowledge of the teas offered, together with the quality of food, service, décor, ambience, and presentation. With 125 points to be lost or gained on the judge's scorecard, only those tea establishments achieving the very highest standards across a number of categories can make it to the top.

Commenting on Priory House Tea Rooms winning an Award of Excellence, Head of The Tea Guild Irene Gorman said: "Each year the standard of entrants for the awards continues to scale new heights, making the judges' task of choosing those who achieve an Award of Excellence extremely challenging, and this year's competition was no exception. This Award of Excellence to Priory House Tea Rooms was presented in recognition of consistently high standards of tea making and customer service, evident in the care and attention to detail with which afternoon tea was prepared and served."

Tea Consultant Malcolm Ferris-Lay said: "I would like to heartily congratulate the team for gaining the Award of Excellence from the Tea Council. To gain this award in your first year is very unusual and you should be enormously proud of your achievements. "

Helen Walker-Sygrove, the Priory House Manager, is absolutely delighted that this award has been achieved. "It is the result of a lot of hard work and commitment, not only by the staff, but also Malcolm Ferris-Lay, our tea advisor, who has given up his own time to encourage, train and support all the staff at Priory House and without whom we could not have achieved so much so quickly.'



## Hazel O'Connor

This year's headline act for Dunstable Rocks is 80s superstar Hazel O'Connor. Speaking exclusively to Talk of the Town prior to her big gig this August, Hazel talks about her career, her thoughts on coming to Dunstable and being caught with her pants down!

#### What was the last album/single you bought?

The last album I bought was Leonard Cohen who sung Hallelujah, but the last single (who buys singles anymore?) was a charity song I recorded for my mum's hospice, 'Re-Royce'. It was a Christmas song and featured other 80s stars like Carole Decker, Toyah, Pauline Black and Kid Creole. I kept going into HMV to buy the single to help raise more funds for the hospice and get it up the charts to help the cause. It was very special to me to record a single like this with so many great artists.

## What should people expect from watching you perform at Dunstable Rocks?

Energy, passion and some poignant moments, something which has become my signature at gigs. The gig will be accessible for all ages, with some Breaking Glass and some new stuff which seems to always go down well. Above all it will be a lot of fun and I am so excited to come and play. I just did a gig in Milton Keynes and that went down a storm!

Have you ever played Dunstable before? I can't remember playing in Dunstable before, but, to be honest, trying to remember every gig so far back is impossible. So, who knows? I might have done!

### You have just being touring 'Breaking Glass Tour', how did it go?

I have just finished the tour with my girls, as a trio. It was fantastic, nearly everywhere was sold out and I was so happy just hopping in my car and wandering around England playing the gigs. I love to go off with the girls shopping before and catch up with them! The tour was fantastic and I couldn't have wished it to have gone any better.

## Can you tell us a bit more about the band you will be bringing with you at Dunstable Rocks? There will be a total of six of us on stage, three

girls, including myself, and three boys. Claire Hirst used to be the sax player in The Belle Stars and performed on tracks with David Bowie; Sarah Fisher was the pianist for the Eurythmics. The three boys play guitar, bass and drums. Look out for the drummer, he looks like Prince Harry! With this line-up it is going to be kicking!

What music do you listen to now?
At the moment I am really into Latin. The story behind this is that two years ago when my mum died I got really depressed and about a year later I thought I needed to do something and start living again. So I created a list of what I wanted to do and one of those things was ballroom dancing (unfortunately Strictly have never asked me to

take part, I would love that!), so I started lessons in my local village after seeing an advert and I got so into the Latin dances, especially salsa and tango. The effect of this meant I got really into Latin music and I haven't stopped listening to it since. The 'new' music for me is audio books. I don't listen to music in the car anymore, as it can sometimes distract me from my gig or my own song writing, so when I'm travelling five to six hours touring, I listen to audio books which have really caught my imagination. I would really like my own autobiography to become an audio book

#### What part of performing live do you enjoy the

All of it! Seriously though I really do. I must admit I don't enjoy the hours of driving, but nothing beats performing live. Over the years, without corporate support, I have learnt a lot myself from lighting to sounds and I now know what makes a good show. I definitely know now what I do and don't like on stage. I also like the feeling of being scared, especially when I am performing new material from the album and wondering if they will like it or not. Like many artists, just before I go on stage I get into a 'zone' and then I can breathe easy and enjoy the show.

I must admit the one that most recently sticks in my mind is the one I played in Milton Keynes. It was perfection from the venue, lighting, and the audience. From an artistic point of view it took my breath away and I loved it! Going back a bit another gig that I remember (but I wasn't actually performing at) was Live Aid in the 80s. I got invited to the celebrity area to watch the concert and at the end everyone was invited to sing 'Feed the World'. I was stood next to George Michael and Alison Moyet singing at Wembley! It was a moment I will never forget.

#### Who has supported you the most in your

Well, behind the scenes definitely the McGann brothers. They supported me a lot and Joe McGann helped me with a film that I was getting produced. The other big artist was David Bowie. He was very helpful and gave me some great advice. The producer for Breaking Glass was the same producer for Bowie and he arranged for me to meet him as he knew I was a massive fan. Bowie really was like a hero to me! When I got to the studio he was recording and I was so excited after exchanging pleasantries he turned around and asked me for a haircut! (He knew that I used to cut my manager's hair.) Obviously I said

'yes, if we have some scissors'. So with some blunt office scissors and a dirty tea towel I cut his hair! He was so thrilled he turned up at my next gig to watch me. He gave me some great advice because I struggle so much with the fame side of my career. To quote he said: 'Of course the public will know you better than you think, because they have read all about you and that isn't their fault. What you need to do is re-set the balance, so when an excited fan comes to you and tells you how much they love you, ask them their name and a little bit about them to equalise it. I am gregarious, but with an equal balance, so it is not all about me.' I really took his advice and it helped me a lot.


## What's the funniest thing that has happened to you on tour or on stage that you still laugh at? Oh yes... (laughs). It was the very first time I

got my standing ovation at the Cannes Film Festival. I was warned that the audience can get quite negative if they don't like the film, so I was preparing for the worst, but when the credits started rolling, everyone got up on their feet and started clapping. Unknown to me, when this happens there is a guy with a huge spotlight that is told if it is positive feedback to shine the spotlight on us so we can bow. However, that day I was wearing tight leather trousers, and because I didn't want VPL (visible panty line) I wasn't wearing any knickers. As I do normally in cinemas to get comfy I had undone the buttons on my trousers. Well, when the spotlight hit us my manager grabbed my hand to stand me up, but he grabbed me so quickly that my trousers got caught and came down to my ankles, so I was stood there to a standing ovation with my trousers round my ankles wearing no knickers!

#### And to end?

My mantra in life, to quote Shakespeare and my mum, is 'to thine own self be true'. I believe in this so much, when things get bad or I can't control what is happening I just think of this quote! If any moment is bad, instead of moaning about it, own it!

## potlight On...



#### DTC's Senior Community and Young People's Officer

Jacqui Groom-Tully is the Town Council's newest recruit, having recently started as the Senior Community and Young People's Officer. Based in Grove Corner, the Town Council's hub for young people located on High Street North, Jacqui will be responsible for working with the young people of Dunstable to develop the services and activities delivered for young people by the Town Council.

#### Tell us a bit about your background?

I started with mums and tots, moving on to play groups, and then to play schemes. I have also had youth work roles with Bedfordshire County Council and Dunstable Town Council.

#### What made you want to get into youth work?

I saw some youth workers working with young people and wanted to try it as they were impressive.

#### What is the funniest story you have from working with young people?

There are so many incidents that are funny at the time or on reflection, to choose one is hard. One extreme example is a game of trust designed to understand visually impaired individuals, which involves turning the chairs back to back into a row and getting one row to describe a picture they are holding and for the second row to draw what they are told. The pictures produced rarely look like they should and some pictures that are produced are just funny. Or the police officer who was supporting a project who broke his finger bowling.

#### What was your most memorable moment of working with young people?

Again, this question is hard to answer. The young people that I have worked with have been amazing. Decorating the changing rooms at Downside Community Centre and all the young people turned up every day; or the young people taking part in a presentation, when before they could not even answer a question in the class room. Just two examples, there are many more...

#### What are you most looking forward to in your new role as Senior Community and Young People's Officer?

Getting to know the young people who use Grove Corner, and how to encourage other young people to access the service as well as getting to know my new colleagues and learning from them.

#### In no more than 50 words, tell us why young people should use Grove Corner.

I think young people should use Grove Corner for the following reasons:

To meet up with their friends to enjoy themselves and have fun!

To just have somewhere safe to go.

To speak to organisations that have the information they need.

To seek support with their issues.

To get their voice heard about issues that are affecting them.

To participate in structured programmes (which helps personal development).

To have someone to share a problem/issue with.

Look after my grandchildren, play taxi driver and personal shopper.



### **Preservation of Tudor Wall Paintings** Wins Heritage Lottery Fund Support

The Friends of Priory House and Gardens, Dunstable have received £43,600 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for an exciting project: the conservation and preservation of significant Tudor wall paintings.

Six panels were discovered in 1954 in the first-floor storeroom of a shop in High Street North, Dunstable, and depict various woodland hunting scenes in colour, featuring a rabbit, stag and hunting dog, but the most remarkable panel includes a portrait of a man in Tudor costume smoking a clay pipe. Another seven panels, showing fruit and foliage, were then uncovered in the 1980s when the shop underwent extensive alterations.

Further conservation work is now needed which will then preserve these precious artefacts as part of Dunstable's heritage. An Elizabethan painters and stainers workshop, a presentation on clay pipe smoking, talks by volunteers about the paintings and a Tudor exhibition are just a few of the events the Friends have planned to which the local community, visitors and tourists will be invited.

Commenting on the award, Sue Turner, Secretary of the Friends, said: "We are very grateful to the Heritage Lottery Fund for supporting this project as it means everyone will now have the opportunity to see these beautiful paintings for many years to come."

Robyn Llewellyn, Head of Heritage Lottery Fund East of England, said: "HLF are delighted to fund this project which will mean that more people are aware of the paintings and what they mean to the Town. The project will also ensure that they are in an environment that will keep them safe for the future, meaning that future generations will also be able to enjoy them."

## Blooming Marvellous Medieval Dunstable

Dunstable is entering the Anglia in Bloom competition again in 2013 and this year's In Bloom theme will reflect the 800th anniversary of the Priory Church as well as the national theme of Edible Britain. With two Gold medals and a Silver Gilt medal already under its belt, the Town Council will be working closely with Promoting Dunstable to secure another Gold medal again this year.

The 2013 campaign was officially launched by the Town Mayor of Dunstable, Councillor Mrs Patricia Staples, on Saturday 13 April 2013 at Priory Gardens. Volunteers including the Medieval Dunstable project team, In Bloomers, Friends of Priory House and Gardens and local schools came together to plant a Physic Garden funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Designed by a local volunteer landscape designer, this new garden feature includes a wide range of culinary and medicinal plants used since medieval times by the Augustinian Canons of Dunstable Priory. The garden is split into sections to display some of the plants used for coughs, colds and flu, headaches and restorative tonics, digestion and liver, and bladder and kidneys ailments. The garden also has a Flowery Mead, a Scented Herber and an area displaying plants used for dyeing cloth.

Priory Gardens is an award-winning Green Flag site managed by Dunstable Town Council and the gardens are free to enter and accessible at all times. Priory House Heritage Centre is situated adjacent to the gardens and visitors can make use of the award-winning tea rooms, browse in the gift shop and enjoy the displays in the exhibition galleries.
