




Hallowe'en Ghost Walks led by the Dunstable Town Guides

Major Infrastructure Projects Making Good Progress

Woodside Link

Opens Spring 2017

The Woodside Link is a 1.8-mile road connecting the industrial areas of Dunstable and Houghton Regis with the new M1 motorway junction 11a. It plays a valuable part in local regeneration, bringing the essential connectivity required for the creation of thousands of new jobs, and over 5,000 homes. Alongside economic benefits, it will help reduce congestion in town centres, in conjunction with a proposed series of vehicle weight restrictions around the local road networks. The scheme includes two bridges over Houghton Brook, a number of junctions, and specially commissioned artwork on the road's retaining wall and acoustic barriers.

Contribute to the Anthem


The Woodside Link will be the first UK road to have its own anthem produced as a collaboration between local residents, visual artist Bettina Furnée and sound artist Marcus Leadley. Residents are invited to contribute to the anthem by recording their own favourite local sounds - using mobile phones or other devices - before emailing them to woodsidelink@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk. Selected sounds will become part of a three-minute celebratory sound and image composition called Anthem for the Road.

Progress to Date

- Site establishment complete
- 50% topsoil strip carried out
- Bulk earthworks commenced
- Archaeological investigations approximately 75 percent complete north of Houghton Brook
- Pre-earthworks drainage installed north of Houghton Brook

Next Stages of Works

- Complete topsoil strip
- Complete archaeological investigations
- Begin the construction of Houghton Brook Bridge
- Complete site clearance
- Begin main drainage works




A5-M1 Link

Opens Spring 2017

The A5-M1 Link is to be a new 2.8-mile, two-lane dual carriageway with three new junctions. It will improve journeys for long-distance traffic travelling through Dunstable. There will be a roundabout with the A5 at the western end of the link road, a second one at the intersection with the A5120 Bedford Road and a new interchange with the M1 motorway to be named junction 11a at the eastern end of the link road. In addition, there will be bridges over the motorway on both Sundon Road and B579 Luton Road, and there will be four new bridges passing over the A5-M1 Link.

Progress to Date

- Completed 90% of site clearance
- Archaeology investigations complete to main line works
- Traffic management in place for safety
- Bulk cut earthworks 60 per cent complete
- Installed 7km of boundary fencing
- Installed 8km of ditches pre-earth works
- Installed 70 per cent of the scheme's piped culverts, linking to the ditches
- Completed 90 per cent of the top soil strip within the scheme's footprint (topsoil to be reused)
- Luton road west and east local roads bulk earthworks complete
- Work on Sundon Road Bridge started
- Main line drainage 20 per cent complete



Creasey Park CFC Developments

Creasey Park Community Football Centre has undergone a summer of improvements. Significant investment has enhanced and upgraded all areas of the centre.

A new dining area has been built outside the main entrance providing an attractive alfresco cafe area to enjoy your purchased refreshments. There are future plans to install some small playground units for young children to enjoy.

A new 1.8 metre-wide viewing area has been installed around the perimeter of the synthetic pitch. The new viewing area is fully accessible for wheelchair users and will improve the spectator experience for everyone. The synthetic pitch has also been refurbished with 38 tonnes of new rubber crumb. New steps have been installed providing safe access for

players and spectators from the main pedestrian walkway to the youth pitches.





The centre has undergone an upgrade with improved soft furnishings to create a welcoming family environment. The bar area has an area for all to enjoy, a new games area with cube stools, pool table, games console and dart board.

The Creasey Park Stadium has been improved to meet FA requirements, due to Dunstable Town FC's promotion to the Southern Premier League. Fans have the pick of an extra 100 seats, new turnstile and an additional stand, to be installed in May 2016.

Finding your way to Creasey Park Community Football Centre has been made easier with new highway signage from the A5 and West Street. There is also now clear signage indicating the additional car park that Creasey Park Community Football Centre benefits from during busy periods. The additional car park can house up to 100 cars and is located on Brewers Hill Road. Access to Creasey Park Community Football Centre is gained from the top left hand corner and is only a 50 metre walk to the centre.

Dunstable International Twinning Association (DITA)


DITA is a voluntary association that exists to promote and encourage twinning activities between Dunstable and our two twin towns - Bourgoin-Jallieu (B-J) in south eastern France (lying between Lyon and Grenoble) and Porz am Rhein (Porz), a city district of Cologne in Germany. The Association's members are drawn from both the Town Council and representatives of local clubs and organisations.

Town twinning came into its own after the Second World War with the desire to rebuild and contribute to the reunification of Europe. Friendships were forged between towns in the UK and Europe, generally being of a like size, economically comparable or geographically similar. The British Council oversees the initial formal arrangements.

Dunstable's association with Porz began in the 1950's and has endured ever since. Our relationship with Bourgoin-Jallieu had its foundations in 1989 with students from the then Dunstable College (now Central Bedfordshire College) and the Lycee Professionnel Gambetta, engaging in work experience in each other's towns. A formal twinning agreement was signed in May 2005.

While there are formal civic exchanges between the representatives of the respective Councils, the real success of twinning is in the enthusiasm of the towns' citizens for various exchanges. For example, there is a regular annual tennis match between Dunstable and Porz and various clubs have exchanged visits with Bourgoin-Jallieu.

DITA is keen to encourage schools to be more active in developing relationships. As languages are again being given a greater emphasis on the curriculum, the time is ripe to develop friendships with like schools in our twin towns. We also wish to see more local clubs, societies and cultural organisations taking advantage of the opportunities offered for friendship and especially, sporting exchanges.

Why did you agree to be Mayor in 2014/15?

How many official engagements as Mayor did you attend?

160 in addition to my Mayoral duties as Chairman of the Council.

What did you enjoy the most when you were Mayor?

There wasn't a great deal that was not enjoyable, but if I have to pick one aspect then the camaraderie my wife and I enjoyed with the dignitaries we met on a regular basis (the 'Chain Gang') must rank

What were your most memorable moments as Mayor?

There were many memorable moments and it is difficult to make a selection but here are a few:

- Being installed in the Office
- Attendance at the presentation of new colours to the Anglia Regiment at Duxford
- · Our visit to Bourgoin-Jallieu and speaking to 200 delegates in French!
- Opening Grove Skate Park
- Topping out the Quantum Care Home in Church Street
- Watching 40-plus truck tractors roll through Dunstable raising funds for the Help for Heroes Charity.

How much did you raise for your charities, and what have they been able to do with the funds you raised?

The total raised was £6,504; £1000 for Help for Heroes; £2,252 to the Dunstable Guides for the replacement of fire doors at their Windy Sales facility; and a similar amount to the Fourth Dunstable Scout Group to boost their building fund.

What do you miss the most now you are no longer Mayor?

The hustle and bustle of the year, particularly as I have now left the Council.

Do you have any further comments regarding your Year?

I would like to take this opportunity to thank, on behalf of my wife and myself, everyone who made the year so remarkable. Green Flag Success

Two of the town's parks are among 137 other parks and green spaces across the East of England that are proudly flying a Green Flag Award, after being judged to be some of the best in the country. Priory and Grove House Gardens have retained their Green Flag Award status again this year for the fifth year running. The awards show that these parks have met the high and exacting standards required of the Green Flag Award Scheme.

The Green Flag Awards Scheme is run by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy and the parks are judged by an army of more than 700 green-space experts, who volunteer their time to visit applicant sites and assess them against eight strict criteria, including horticultural standards, cleanliness, sustainability and community involvement.

The Chair of Dunstable Town Council's Grounds and Environmental Service Committee, Councillor Gloria Martin said: "The awards recognise and reward the best parks and green spaces across the country. A Green Flag flying overhead is a sign to the public that these parks boast the highest possible standards, are beautifully maintained and have excellent facilities. We are absolutely delighted to retain our Green Flags as they recognise and highlight that people in Dunstable are benefitting from green spaces of the very highest quality."


